2. ALL Farm & Garden exhibits MUST BE entered at the Farm & Garden registration table. Please use the GREEN Farm & Garden Entry Form. Be sure you attach the GREEN ENTRY TAGS to your Farm & Garden exhibit when entering.
3. It will be beneficial to have address labels with you when entering exhibits.
4. All exhibits are to be grown and entered by the exhibitor.
5. All exhibitors must be residents of Harford County or reside within a 20 mile radius of the fairgrounds.
6. Quantities specified in the exhibit list will be strictly enforced.
7. Each exhibitor is limited to one entry per class.
8. All judge's decisions are final.

DEPARTMENT V - AMATEUR WINES

Specifications:

- Entry must be produced by the exhibitor.
- Exhibitors must not be involved in any way with commercial wine making or use the facilities of commercial wineries.

- No artificial coloring or flavoring agents are allowed in entries.
- Entries shall be entered in standard 750 ml or “fifth” wine bottles.
- Composite, plastic, or natural corks only. Screw tops also acceptable. No patterns or names on corks.
- Harford County wines must be made from fruit grown in Harford County.
- Following judging, all wine bottles will be emptied.

DEPARTMENT VI - EGGS

Open to producers with fewer than 100 chickens.

Specifications:

- Individual eggs with an entry should be uniform in size.
 - Small size – 18-20 oz.
 - Medium size – 21-23 oz.
 - Large size – 24-26 oz.
 - Extra Large size – 27-30 oz.
- All sizes to compete in same class.
- Disqualifications:
 - One or more eggs in entry with adhering dirt or prominent stains covering over ¼ shell surface which causes general appearance of entry to be unclean
 - Any inedible egg according to USDA standards, including large meat or blood spots
 - Less than the required number of eggs in entry
 - Variety of sizes in entry
- Container must be plain, no identification.
- Exhibitor's flock eggs only.
- Exhibitors are limited to one entry per class.

- All trees must be plantation grown in Harford County and must be from 5 ft to 8 ft in height from the bottom of the handle to the tip of the leader.
- All trees must be sheared.
- Stands will be provided.
- Exhibitors are limited to one entry per class.
- You do not have to return at the close of the fair for your tree. Fair personnel will dispose of the exhibit.

- Fleeces must be from the current 2016-2017 wool crop and represent no more than 15 months growth.
- Each fleece must be clean, free of chaff, burrs, tags, and second cuts.
- Fleece must be bundled and placed in a clear plastic garbage bag.
- Exhibitors are limited to one entry per class.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

- The contest is open to residents of Harford County and within a 20 mile radius surrounding the fair grounds and aged 8 years and older.
- Only one exhibit per entrant.
- Sign-up is available at the compost educational exhibit during the Farm Fair.
- Compost entries must be received at the University of Maryland Cooperative Extension - Harford County Office by 4:00 PM on May 15, 2017.
- Compost entries must be submitted on or before the due date to allow adequate time for judging.
- Compost entries must have been made by the entrant from farm animal manures, yard materials and/or garden materials. Compost made from human or pet wastes will not be allowed.
- Compost entries will become the property of the Harford County Farm Fair following judging.
- Winners will be posted during the Farm Fair.
- Compost entries may be on display during the Farm Fair.
- Compost entries will be judged for completeness of composting, organic content, and suitability for growing plants.
- The decisions of the judges are final.
- One (1) gallon of compost is required for each exhibit. Compost entries must be submitted in sealed (Ziplock© type) plastic bag and can be measured using a gallon milk container with the top cut off.
- Entry must be labeled with the name of entrant and the method of composting.
- Winners are required to pick up ribbons and premiums on Sunday, July 30 between 10:00 AM-2:00 PM. Ribbons and premiums not picked up may be forfeited. No ribbons or premiums will be mailed.
- Entries will be divided into a group for vermiculture and a group for bin compost.
- The 1st and 2nd place winners from each category will compete for Champion and Reserve Champion.

5. Entries will be judged for functionality, creativity, workmanship, and practicality.
6. Entries should include a short narrative explaining which parts are home- or hand-made and which are purchased lure parts.
7. The decisions of the judges are final.
8. Bait lures (not flies) should be made to have removable hooks. At the time of entry, the hooks should be removed for the safety of the viewing public and a paper clip(s) put to show the location of the hook sets.
9. Winners are required to pickup ribbons and premiums on Sunday, July 30 between 10:00 AM-2:00 PM. Ribbons and premiums not picked up may be forfeited. No ribbons or premiums will be mailed. Items not picked up will become the property of the Farm Fair.

6. Each entry in all departments must have an official entry tag correctly and clearly filled out. Please provide name and address labels for use on entry tags, if you are entering many exhibits.
7. No entry will be accepted unless there is a specified class listed in the premium list.
8. All exhibitors must be residents of Harford County or reside within a 20 mile radius of the fairgrounds.
9. All entries must be fresh, clean and conform to size or content specifications.

10. All entries should have been completed within the past year: August 2016-July 2017. An exhibit which was entered in the Harford County Farm Fair in previous years will not be accepted.
11. The decisions of the judges are final. The right is reserved for judges to open and examine all entries, and to refrain from awarding prizes when the entry is not worthy by their judgment.
12. See various departments for specific rules pertaining to those exhibits.
13. For your convenience, Home Arts exhibits may be pre-entered on-line at www.farmfair.org by Thursday, July 20. Use the Home Arts Entry Form on the inside back cover.
14. While security will be provided, the Farm Fair will not be responsible for loss or damage to entries.
15. Ribbons will be awarded in each class (1st through 6th) and a premium will be awarded to 1st through 4th places. A Champion and Reserve Champion will be selected in each department.
